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## From the Editor

We are sorry that the publication of this issue is delayed because of very poor quality of English of accepted articles assigned. The preparation for the August issue is in progress that it will be published until the end of this month. Afterwards, all issues will be online in the relevant month and subscribers will receive the print copy in the the same month. We have just started ScholarOne system that we will speed up the review process significantly. We expect that we are going to make the final decision for a submitted article in eight weeks at the latest and publish the accepted studies in the next sixteen weeks. Hence, the whole process from submission to the publication will not be more than 6 months and it would be as short as 4 months. Additionally, all the accepted studies without iThenticate or any other problem resulting with suspended publication (mostly for articles accepted before 2014) will appear in the "Articles in Press" section.

Please make note that in 2013, the average period from submission to the transmission of the first response to the author was 50 days. In the first half of 2014, we shortened it to 18 days. The average time spent for overall evaluation of an article by associate editors, namely, were: Veysel Tahan: 13 days, Seyfettin Köklü and Şahin Çoban: 19 days, Ahmet Danalıoğlu: 21 days, Ömer Başar: 26 days, and Billur Canbakan: 30 days. I am grateful to them for their perseverance.

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
